SCRAPIE

- *Scrapie is a degenerative disease that affects the nervous systems of sheep and goats.
- *Scrapie ID has been a national requirement since 2002. Pickaway Fair requires **ALL market & breeding sheep and goats** to be identified by the breeder with a USDA approved ear tag or tattoo.
- *Approved ID includes: USDA provided or approved ear tags, USDA assigned tattoos; or registration tattoos when accompanied(must bring to fair) by a copy of the registration certificate. Do not purchase a goat with a blue scrapie tag.
- *The bottom line: You should not take your animal from the breeder until they have put a Scrapie ID on it!

A few things to know:

- Market goat and lactating Dairy goat exhibitors must complete QA annually. Quality Assurance training is completed in-person or by on-line YQCA by May 1 with certification received at the Extension Office by May 2.
- Each exhibitor must register their animals for fair through the online program set up by the Livestock & Sale Committee. On-line registration is open from April 15-May 15.
- t is important to start working with your animal early. You will need to teach your goat to walk, set-up, figure 8, and "brace" for the show.
- All market goats must be dehorned. If not de-horned at birth, this can be difficult. If horns must be trimmed, they may not be longer than 2 inches at fair.
- Goats are prone to urinary calculi. Be sure to feed a quality feed designed for market goats as the proper balance of calcium and phosphorus is very important in preventing urinary calculi.
- Drenching at the fair is not permitted except by a veterinarian. Drenching is defined as an act of using an instrument placed in an animal's mouth to orally administer a liquid, food, or any other substance.
- Sale intentions must be made! Sale Intentions are required for every market exhibitor for every market show they participate in, even if it's only one! Sale Intentions tell the Sale Committee which animals you are planning to sell through the Livestock Sale and which animals will be loaded onto the packer truck.
- At the Sale, make sure your market goats are loaded onto the packer truck even if you did not sell your market goats through the ring.
