What is the judge looking for?	Heavy muscled, heavy structured, structurally correct, able to walk with ease	Purebreds must meet breed assoc. standards. Structurally correct, able to walk with ease, evenly spaced & well-formed teats on each side, well-shaped & sized vulva

A few things to know:

- ❖ Each exhibitor must register their animals for fair through the online program set up by the Livestock & Sale Committee. On-line registration is open from April 15-May 15.
- ❖ Prior to the fair, it is helpful to weigh your hog every other week if possible.
- ❖ You must be enrolled and complete (skillathon and project book) a breeding hog project at the county in order to exhibit it at state fair. Showing at county is not required.
- ❖ Animals used for a Swine Breeding project may not be used for a Market Hog project as well.
- ❖ Walk your hog daily in the cool part of the day. Early mornings or late afternoon/evening is best.
- ❖ Quality Assurance training is completed by on-line YQCA. Must be completed annual between October and May 1 with certification received at the Extension Office by May 3.
- ❖ Hogs may not be slick clipped or body shaved. Only the ears and tails may be shaved. Clip ahead of time. No clipping may take place during fair. Hair length must be greater than ½ inch!
- ❖ Hogs are easily stressed! Make your move to the fair as stress-free as possible. Do not move them in the heat of the day. Leave yourself plenty of time to load and transport your hogs. Fair is typically hot. A spray bottle is good to keep your animal cool. Never dump water on an overheated pig!
- ❖ Only water should be used in grooming you hog before and during the show. No oil-based grooming products are permitted.
- ❖ Drenching at the fair is not permitted except by a veterinarian. Drenching is defined as an act of using an instrument placed in an animal's mouth to orally administer a liquid, food, or any other substance.
- ❖ In the show ring, touch your hog as little as possible. Utilize your cane, pipe, or whip to move your hog around the ring.
- ❖ Sale Intentions must be made! Sale Intentions are required for every market exhibitor for every market show they participate in, even if it's only one! Sale Intentions tell the Sale Committee which animals you are planning to sell through the Livestock Sale and which animals will be loaded onto the packer truck.
